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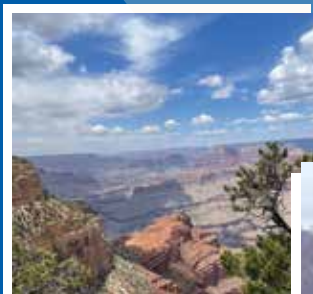

Stacia Rosebrook is not only a dedicated professional protecting vulnerable populations with the Department of Aging, she is also a union activist in her Chapter 2540 as well as an avid traveler. With a career spanning nearly ten years both for the county and the State of Ohio, Stacia is a fierce advocate, both inside her profession and beyond.

As an Administrative Professional 3 within the Department of Aging's Board of Executives of Long-Term Services and Supports, an independent board within the agency, Stacia wears multiple hats. She's involved in the complicated process of licensing new nursing home administrators, guiding them through internships and ensuring compliance with regulatory standards. "The industry needs good administrators," she said, "It's been nice to work with people who are passionate about what they do. That part has been

really exciting," she shared.

But her job responsibilities go beyond just helping to oversee these internships. She's also the sole investigator for the State of Ohio who investigates complaints and rule violations of nursing home administrators. Her work not only ensures accountability but safeguards the well-being of nursing home residents in Ohio. "I feel incredibly honored to be able to help make sure nursing homes are safe places for our seniors to live," she said. "We make sure that the administrators are acting in accordance with maintaining the health and safety of the residents in their care," she explained. "That's incredibly gratifying," she said.

Outside of her career in state service, Stacia is a true Renaissance woman. She's currently pursuing her associate degree, with plans to further her education in Business

Management at Franklin University. This is thanks to the resources provided by the Union Education Trust, she explained. "That group is amazing. They are so timely and helpful," said Stacia, of the union education fund employees.

But her advocacy doesn't stop there. Stacia is also committed to helping her fellow union members on the job. As the treasurer and an activist of her union Chapter 2540, she advocates for the rights and well-being of her colleagues. She recently completed an OCSEA steward training and hopes to put her training to good use soon.

Even with all this, Stacia finds time to pursue other passions outside the office, thanks to a better work/life balance provided by her union contract. One of those passions is as a part-time direct support professional in a residential setting for individuals with disabilities. She also loves

to travel and recently returned from a trip to Washington D.C. to see her son—an elite runner—complete a race during the cherry blossom festival.

Michael has worked as a Naturalist at Dillon State Park in East Central Ohio since 2022.

“It’s imperative for us to be here to help foster these relationships between people and the natural world and to help illuminate the earthly wonders that surround and connect with us all,” said Michael. “While this is an everyday core component of what we do, Earth Day, is a prime time to really shine that spotlight on the importance of it all (as long as we turn that spotlight off at night so as not to detrimentally affect our nocturnal wildlife friends,” he says, adding in a little Naturalist humor.

In April, Michael joined public employee union members and communities around the state in celebrating Earth Day. As a Naturalist, he helped host the park’s annual Earth Day celebration that included educational

Earth Day, observed annually on April 22, serves as a perfect reminder of the invaluable contributions made by Ohio’s public employee union members throughout the year. These dedicated individuals, spanning various agencies including the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, the Ohio Department of Agriculture and so many more, play a pivotal role in managing, preserving, and studying the state’s natural resources.

Among them are proud OCSEA members who inspire Ohioans to become active stewards of the planet. From organizing tree planting events to leading educational workshops on recycling and sustainability, OCSEA members embody a commitment to environmental

opportunities for the public, wildlife, food trucks and more.

“The morning started off with an engaging Tree Talk Hike during which we delved into the world of trees: what they can tell us, how they connect to the rest of the forest (and world), and even the universes of other worlds they harbor,” said Michael, full of excitement about the work he does.

Michael and the park also joined community groups like the Muskingum County Library System and Wild at Hart Wildlife Rehabilitation in the celebration. Michael was joined by a local public librarian to discuss the Earth Day book selection *Wildscape* by Nancy Lawson, which focuses on the often-hidden sensory worlds in nature, he said.

Wild at Hart Wildlife Rehabilitation educated attendees about non-releasable wild animals, including “Flower” the groundhog, who was hit by a car

and suffered permanent damage. “She could not be released back into the wild, but she’s a favorite at events where she makes regular appearances!” said Michael.

In addition, the non-profit volunteer group Friends of Dillon State Park talked to visitors about the importance of supporting our public parks.

Michael also hosted a wildflower seed ball workshop. About 40 seed balls were made using natural clay & tissue paper and Ohio-sourced native wildflower seeds for visitors to disperse in the park or at home.

He also helped tie in citizen science apps and encouraged visitors to contribute to the ongoing Dillon State Park Biodiversity project—“all great ways of fostering a meeting place for the worlds of technology and nature!” he says. □

BUILDING SOLIDARITY MAKES US STRONG

Mobilizing and educating union membership during contract negotiations has been crucial for ensuring that everyone is informed and engaged in the process. It helped to strengthen solidarity and made certain members had their interests represented. Done right, that kind of mobilizing can make the union stronger for everyone involved.

This is exactly the approach that leaders in Ohio Veterans Home Sandusky Chapter 2200 took to build solidarity and boost morale at their facility where Ohio's most vulnerable and cherished citizens live: Our veterans!

The OVH union leaders have diligently been working and thinking creatively to keep members activated, motivated, and informed!

“Our mission has been to get everyone involved as much as possible, to take care of the members and to let the members run the chapter,” said OVH Chapter 2200 President **Tim Federkiel**. Tim, a Maintenance Repair Worker, has served as president for less than a year, but in this brief time has focused on how he can better give members “a sense of ownership over their chapter,” he says.

The chapter has been focusing on building its chapter commit-

tees, says Tim, and to involve more members in decision-making as a team for the good of the chapter. He says the chapter’s Steward and Membership Committees are highly active. The chapter’s OCSEA Bargaining Blitz rally held outside the facility in March, in conjunction with other OCSEA bargaining rallies around the State, was widely attended. It showed that the needle is moving toward more involvement with the union and more understanding about the power of being “union,” said Tim.

Last year, several of the chapter’s elected officers attended OCSEA Leadership Trainings,

focusing on enhancing their leadership skills. They quickly applied their new skills to develop tools for communicating with and mobilizing members. And it paid off! The result: Increased member turnout and participation in things like Wednesday Solidarity Days to foster a strong workplace bond and an understanding of what it really means to be “union.”

“People have started coming to me about wanting to get union training, and I think that’s great! I want everybody who wants to learn and be involved to get what they need,” said Tim. He says the chapter recently approved a standing motion that

makes sure the chapter covers the costs associated with getting stewards trained.

“There’s just something about being able to help other people. It makes me feel good to help co-workers in need,” said **Katrice Stovill**, a Health Information Technician and the chapter’s Chief Steward. Katrice hopes more members will reach out about getting trained and getting involved in the union. She says this is the best way members can get an understanding of their contract, know their rights, and get the skills to help others who need help. “They just need to take the leap and reach out,” said Katrice.

Kelly Valdoff, a Therapeutic Program Worker and the chapter’s secretary, is also passionate about building up the union at OVH Sandusky. She says she wants to squash the negativity and build support for employees within the chapter, like you would a family. “Morale was low, and people were just existing. I wanted things to change,” said Kelly. “You can either be part of the problem or part of the solution, and I want to be part of the solution,” she says.

Kelly says she is excited about all the things she and others can do to build up the union family, like decorating a union bulletin board or wearing “orange” in support of their fellow union workers in ODOT. She says she is proud of the union leaders for

extending themselves to get more people involved and proud of the members who are stepping up to be a part of their union.

Giving back is a huge part of the chapter’s mission to build solidarity, not only on the job but also within the Sandusky community. Recently, the chapter held a food drive and donated boxes of snacks and quick meals to a local Community Center that helps at-risk children and focuses on food insecurity. The chapter is also sponsoring a local baseball team.

The chapter recently proposed a scholarship program that will assist members’ dependents with the costs associated with attending college or vocational school. Funds for the scholarship program will be 100% member generated through raffles and fundraising throughout the year, says Tim. There will be four quarter beef raffles, thanks to a donated steer, that will help fund the scholarships this year and other Labor Gives Back efforts. Upcoming Mother’s Day and Father’s Day basket raffles will also go toward the scholarship program and charitable giving.

“We just want to make a difference in the work we do, in our communities and in our members’ lives,” said Tim. “I believe our chapter has come a long way, and I’m looking forward to what’s to come.” □

I'd be remiss if I didn't give a shout out to our incredible local leadership who stood with us as they watched all this go down. You saw management's familiar scare tactics and knew what we had to do. You knew your union would hold the line and you didn't waiver in your support. We saw that week after week in your solidarity events, in your attendance at rallies, in your visits to our downtown Solidarity Headquarters, in your bargaining blitzes and in the many messages of support the bargaining team received. Thank you for that.

In the meantime, our chapters are back to enforcing the contract, holding management accountable, getting training for their union activists and experiencing union fellowship at our spring and summer conferences.

We are making a big announcement here that you can read more about on page 15, and that's the significant increase in per member funds for the Union Education Trust. The Union Education Trust Trustees have approved an increase from \$6,250 available for OCSEA members to \$8,000. That's an increase of \$1,750 towards our members' education. We're delighted to prioritize our mem-

bers' education and to help make sure our members' career and educational goals are met.

We also have a recent contract win with the creation of a new ODOT Mechanics series through our Article 36.05 process. Our ODOT union mechanics who enter the series will receive at least an approximate 4 percent pay upgrade. In addition, welders, machinists and auto body workers will also have access to the new series if they choose. This was long overdue and I want to thank our union leaders and staff who worked on it.

If you haven't heard by now, we've had some staff changes lately that I wanted to be sure you were aware of. Communications Director Sally Meckling, who has been with the union nearly 25 years, has retired. We wish her well and thank her for her years of service and commitment. I know she'll be missed. We also want to welcome Mike Rowe as the new OCSEA Communications Director. Mike has experience both in broadcast journalism with WSYX 6 in Columbus and as the Communications Director for the minority caucus in the Ohio Senate. Welcome aboard, Mike. We're so glad you're here.

Many of you know Pattie Hill, who has been with OCSEA as a union staff representative for many years. Pattie has taken a promotion and is now the union's Grievance Manager with the Office of General Counsel. Congratulations, Pattie!

As the summer starts to take shape, we'll be offering new contract trainings and we'll kick start our Leadership Trainings to ensure we have strong future leaders who will continue to help move this union forward. □

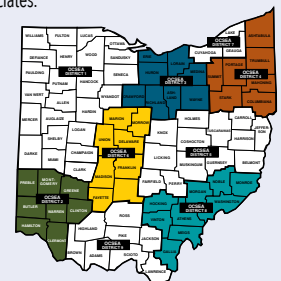

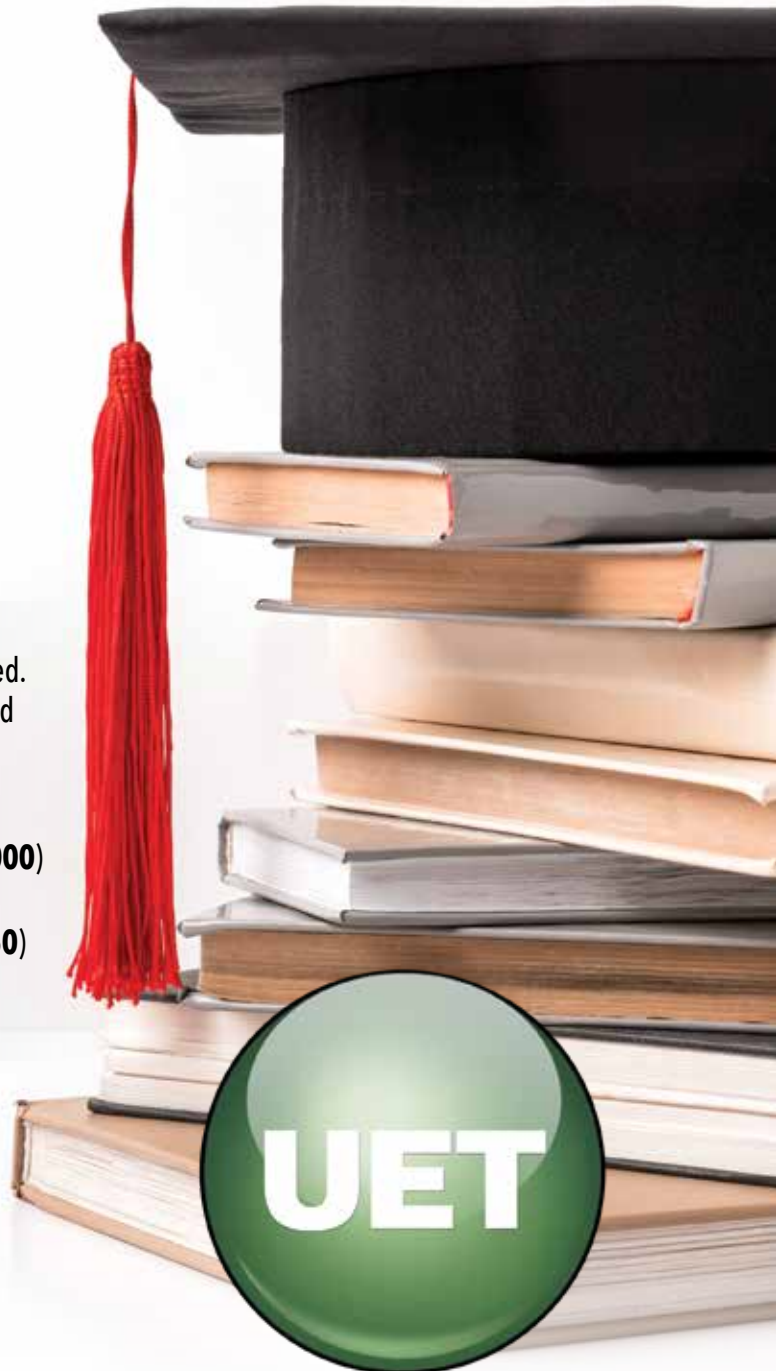

Hazel Chapman:

A Force of Nature

Earlier this year, social media was on fire after Tracy Chapman and Luke Combs sang her award-winning song, *Fast Car*, together as a duet at the Grammy's on live TV. Seeing a black female folk singer and a white country music star harmonize such a beautiful and heart-felt song, seemed just what the country needed in a time of such division and conflict.

Fast Car is at its core a working-class anthem, and that may be because singer-songwriter Chapman has deep roots right in our very own union. Tracy Chapman's mom, **Hazel Chapman**, was not only a single mom raising two daughters in Cleveland, Ohio in the 70s and 80s, but she was also an early OCSEA activist. Hazel knows, first-hand, the force and power

of a union and even helped negotiate the first OCSEA contract with the State of Ohio.

Like many OCSEA activists in those early days, Hazel saw disparate and unequal treatment of state employees, especially women, and vowed to make change in the workplace. "The bosses were always telling, especially woman, if you can't do this, you should look for another job," said Hazel about those early days in state government. "I was a young, divorced, single mom with two kids," she said. "You couldn't keep me down," she said.

And oh boy is Hazel a force to be reckoned with! In her early days, she was a member of the NAACP and worked with the City of Cleveland as well as with local and statewide politicians on projects that helped black youth

as well as women and victims of domestic violence. So, union activism was a natural progression for her.

She got elected to OCSEA's very first bargaining team in 1986. She said when union leaders negotiated the first OCSEA contract, State of Ohio wages were the worst in the country, except for Mississippi. "That was just wrong. We needed, at the very least, a respectable level of pay. But there were a lot of obstacles. We got kicked out of our hotel, so we slept in chairs in the ballroom," she remembered. "At the end we went to impasse," she said. "But we fought hard and there were some good people fighting, too," Hazel recalled of the bargaining team.

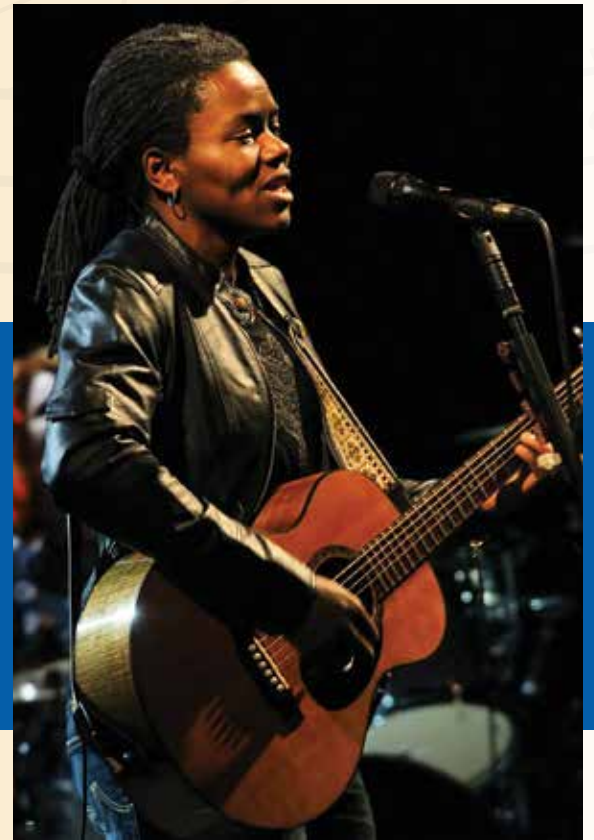
Hazel was a true trail blazer, especially for women unionists. That first OCSEA bargaining

team was very large (over 100 members), and Hazel recalls being undeterred when it came to speaking her mind. "At one point in time, they tried to keep me from speaking at the bargaining table. They told me when I spoke to people, it caused too much confusion and tempers flared. They told me to write down my concerns. I impolitely refused," she said with a grin.

Hazel also recalls speaking from the floor at an OCSEA Convention: "The speech I gave on the floor of the convention, let me just say this—men didn't love it," she laughed.

She also recalls bringing her daughters to union meetings and being unmoved when people looked at her with disapproval.

Hazel, originally employed at the Ohio Department of Motor Vehicles, transferred to

the then Department of Health and Human Services (eventually merging with OBES to become ODJFS). She also was appointed to OCSEA's Statewide Board of Directors and was an active member of the Women's Action Committee (WAC). In fact, she made a motion at an OCSEA board meeting to establish that very committee which is still active today.

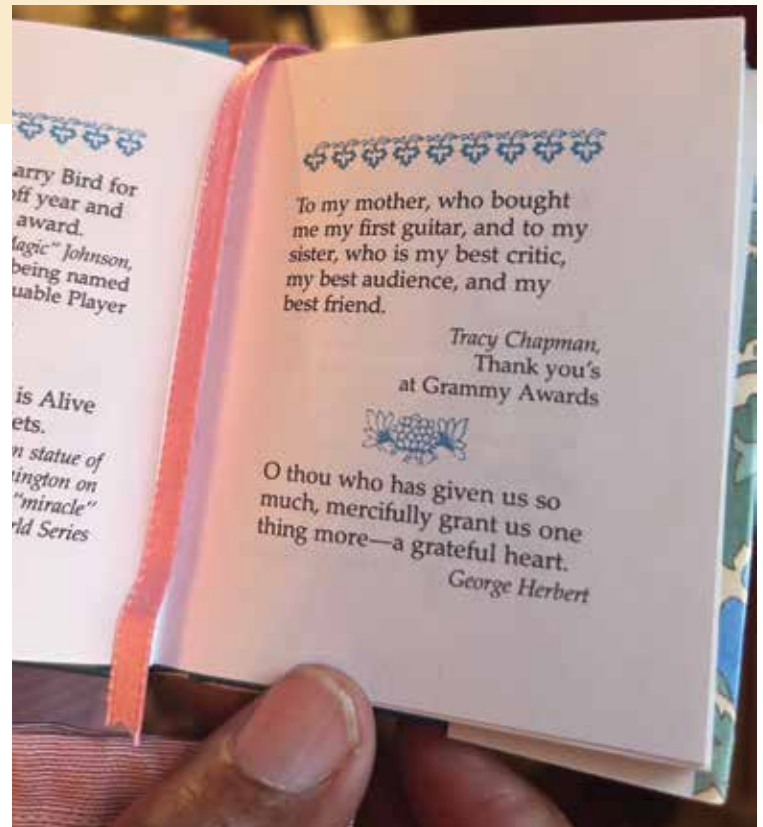
"I've never been one to run away from anything. I raised two fantastic women who do exactly what they want to do because they saw me," she said, referring to Tracy and her sister.

Hazel is, herself, an accomplished singer, poet, and businesswoman. After retiring from the State of Ohio 20 years ago, she sometimes toured with her famous daughter around the U.S. She also traveled to places like

Italy, France and Britain where she got immersed in the art and culture. She continues to stay active in both the entertainment and political realms.

Steve Lieber, a retired OCSEA staff representative who lives in Cleveland, knew Hazel in those early days. "She was tough, no nonsense and no bullshit. She had to protect herself a lot because of her famous daughter," he said. "I think this got revived during the Grammy's," he added. Steve and Hazel remain friends to this day.

Of her many accomplishments, some of her most fond memories involve her work as an OCSEA steward, especially when she was able to get people their jobs back. "If your heart is in it and you see things, you CAN'T leave it go," she said with enthusiasm. □

FIRST ON THE SCENE

EPA UNION MEMBER COORDINATES RESPONSE TO EAST PALESTINE TRAIN DERAILMENT

East Palestine, Ohio, residents are no strangers to the sight and sound of a freight train rolling through their town. However, they had never experienced anything like the night of February 3, 2023, when 52 cars from a Norfolk and Western freight train derailed in the middle of their community.

Almost immediately **Kurt Kollar's** phone started ringing. Kollar, an Environmental Specialist 3 with the Ohio EPA and a member of OCSEA chapter 7760, is an on-scene coordinator for the EPA's Office of Emergency Response. He is often on call 24/7 to respond to disasters whether it's an overturned truck, chemical spill or train derailment. It's the kind of job that he admits can bring an adrenaline rush.

Kollar remembers driving to East Palestine on that cold winter night and seeing an orange glow as he crested a hill three miles

from the derailment. "I don't care who you are, it's like uh-oh," he said. "But that's when your training and preparation for these type of events kick in."

Kollar, who has extensive experience in coordinating emergency responses for other train derailments, was the first person from the Ohio EPA to arrive at the scene. He immediately began working with the East Palestine Fire Department and other agencies to initiate the disaster response. Kollar's immediate priority was coordinating the containment of the chemical spill and monitoring the air quality around the train.

No one was injured during the derailment, but people living near the crash site were evacuated temporarily amid concerns that some of the derailed cars containing hazardous chemicals might explode. Dealing with those dangerous chemicals became the primary responsibility of Kollar and his OCSEA brothers and sisters,

who work for the Ohio EPA.

Kollar credits his colleagues in all the divisions of the agency who worked in East Palestine for their dedication in facing the challenge. "We were all on a common mission of ensuring that not only the residents of East Palestine were safe, but the people of Ohio and Pennsylvania were safe and will remain safe," he said.

Days turned into weeks and weeks into months as federal, state and local agencies grappled with cleaning up the historic disaster. Now, more than a year later, the Ohio EPA continues to monitor ground water and streams in the area to ensure that residents and wildlife are safe.

"One of the things I love most about my job is the chance to be a public servant," Kollar said. "I am surrounded by some terrific professionals," he added.

That sentiment is shared by **Jeff Rizzo**, a Geologist 3 with the Ohio EPA and the president

of Chapter 7760.

"I am incredibly proud of the work that Kurt and other OCSEA members have performed during the initial response and the effort that our OCSEA members continue to do during the ongoing monitoring and clean-up effort," Rizzo said.

Kollar grew up in Youngstown and has been around unions his whole life. He says he's proud to be a member of OCSEA. "It's nice to be part of a union family where we have a common interest to protect each other, look out for each other, make sure working conditions are good and safe and fair," he said.

Kollar has worked for the Ohio EPA for 32 years. He could be retired by now but has no plans to call it quits. "I love what I do," he said. "I'm two years past retirement, and people ask me, 'When are you going to go?' When I stop loving it, I guess." □

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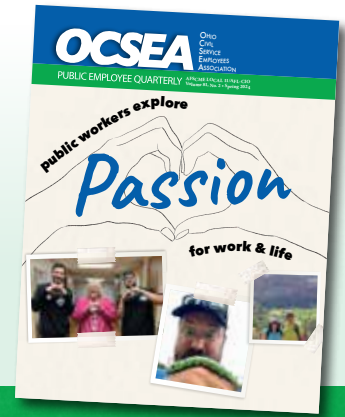


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
